Introduction

This guide is for anyone who needs to know about a restricted club licence and its conditions. This may include:

- new club committee members, nominees or managers
- existing committee members
- staff at a club with a restricted club licence.

Once you have completed this guide, you should be able to:

- identify when and where you are allowed to supply alcohol to members and their guests
- identify any special conditions that apply to your licence type
- identify possible breaches of a restricted club licence.

This guide includes:

- **licence conditions** – explaining in detail parts of your licence (page 6)

General information

Trading hours	<p>A restricted club licence allows the licensee to supply liquor to members, members' guests and the general public (during club events and functions) at a club during the times and days specified in the licence.</p> <p>Your licence may specify trading hours for:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • specific days and times of the week (for example, Thursday and Saturday, 5pm to 9.30pm) • specific areas of the club • specific periods of the year (for example, April to September). <p>Note: You have a 30-minute period after closing time for customers to finish purchased drinks. During this time, you cannot sell them any more alcohol.</p>
Liquor licence and posters	<p>At your club, you are required to display:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • a copy of the current liquor licence, where the public can see it • the following posters (signage): <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – 'Intoxicated, Drunk, Disorderly?' – 'Under 18? No supply'. <p>Posters must be printed in colour on A4 (210 x 297mm) paper and displayed so the public can see the information.</p>
Red line plan	<p>The red line plan (the plan) shows where alcohol can be sold and consumed at your club.</p> <p>The plan is submitted with the licence application. If the licence is transferred to you from an existing licence owner, Liquor Control Victoria (LCV) will have an approved plan.</p> <p>If Victoria Police or an LCV inspector visits you, they will likely request a copy of your plan to check you are operating within the red line area.</p>
Amenity	<p>Amenity is the impact your club, members, or visitors may have on the surrounding area.</p> <p>Your club should consider the following amenity impacts:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Parking facilities Do you have a car park? Do members or visitors park on nearby residential streets? • Traffic movement and density Is there a lot of traffic in the surrounding area from members or visitors coming to your club? • Noise levels What measures do you have in place to minimise noise from your club (if you have amplified music) or from members or visitors leaving your club? • Possibility of nuisance or vandalism Are your members or visitors likely to cause a nuisance to nearby residents? Could they cause noise, nuisance or damage to property or cars? • Harmony and coherence of the environment What general effect does your club have on the local community and neighbouring businesses/residents?

Non-member functions	<p>Your restricted club licence does not permit you to hold non-member functions where the function organiser supplies their own alcohol.</p> <p>In this situation, the organiser requires their own temporary limited licence.</p> <p>You should ask the function organiser for a copy of their temporary limited licence for your records.</p>
Members' and guests' registers	<p>A members' register must be kept, which contains the following details:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • name • residential address • last membership payment details. <p>Note: Members are not required to sign in each time they use the club.</p> <p>A register of members' guests and visitors to the club must be kept, which contains the following details:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • guest/visitor's name • guest/visitor's residential or email address • name of the member of whom they are a guest (if applicable) • date they visited the club. <p>Note: Guests and visitors must sign in each time they visit the club.</p> <p>The club secretary ensures registers are kept on the club premises. The registers must be available for inspection by Victoria Police or an LCV inspector.</p>
Underage members and visitors (minors)	<p>Minors are not allowed to be served or drink alcohol on licensed premises under any circumstances.</p> <p>Many sporting clubs have junior teams that train and play sporting games at the club. Clubs must apply to LCV requesting permission to allow anyone under 18 years of age to participate in club activities. To apply, complete the <i>Permanent underage authority for clubs</i> form at vic.gov.au/vary-or-transfer-liquor-licence</p> <p>Where permission is granted, the licence will include the terms and conditions. This usually includes a time by which minors must leave the club premises.</p> <p>The Act states that a person under 18 years may be on a licensed premises if they are in the company of a responsible adult.</p> <p>A responsible adult is a person who is over the age of 18 years and who is:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • the younger person's parent, step-parent, guardian or grandparent • the younger person's spouse (over the age of 18 years) • a person acting in place of a parent and who is supervising the young person (for example, a sports coach).
Sub-letting	<p>A licensee must not let or sublet any part of the licensed premises (whether the sublet allows the supply of alcohol or not) or assign the right to supply alcohol to a third party without the consent of LCV. To apply, complete the <i>Sublet premises or right to supply liquor</i> form available at vic.gov.au/vary-or-transfer-liquor-licence</p>

Allowing other persons to carry on a business of supplying alcohol	You must seek LCV's approval if anyone else, except you or your employee, is to supply alcohol at your club. To apply, complete the <i>Sublet premises or right to supply alcohol form</i> available at vic.gov.au/vary-or-transfer-liquor-licence
Other	<p>Relevant information about your licence:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Annual licence renewal is due on 31 December. A good compliance history can reduce your fees, see vic.gov.au/demerit-point-star-rating-systems-liquor-licensing. • Join the Liquor Portal at liquorportal.vcglr.vic.gov.au/liquorportal/ to access your licence and renewal notice and update your details. • Apply for a temporary licence at vic.gov.au/apply-temporary-limited-liquor-licence if you wish to extend your trading hours or red line area for a one-off event. • Vary your licence by completing the variation to an existing licence form at vic.gov.au/vary-or-transfer-liquor-licence. • Surrender your licence when you no longer need it at vic.gov.au/surrender-liquor-licence. • Find out more about your obligations as a licensee at vic.gov.au/liquor-licensee-obligations.

GENERAL INFORMATION

A liquor licence does not override local laws, planning schemes and conditions on planning permits. It is the responsibility of the licensee to ensure they comply with these and all conditions of a planning permit above what is specified on the liquor licence. Where the trading hours on your planning permit are less than the trading hours on this liquor licence, you must comply with the hours on the planning permit.

TYPE OF LICENCE

This licence is a restricted club licence and authorises the licensee to supply liquor on the licensed premises to:-

- a) a member of the club or a guest of a member for consumption on the licensed premises; and
- b) to members of the public at functions or club events for consumption on the licensed premises, during the trading hours specified below

AMENITY

The licensee shall not cause or permit undue detriment to the amenity of the area to arise out of or in connection with the use of the premises to which the licence relates during or immediately after the trading hours authorised under this licence.

PERIOD OF LICENCE - SECTION 50(2)

This licence is only in force during April to September inclusive each year.

Internal area -

Sunday	Between 12noon and 8.30pm
Monday to Wednesday	Between 12noon and 10.30pm
Thursday	Between 12noon and 10pm

Sunday	Between 12noon and 8.30pm
Monday to Wednesday	Between 12noon and 9.30pm
Thursday to Saturday	Between 12noon and 10pm

APPROVALS/CONSENTS

Section 120(2)(e). Persons under the age of 18 years are permitted on the licensed premises other than in the company of a responsible adult in relation to preparation for and participation in sporting activities only. This approval does not include social activities but does include presentation functions. The approval applies during the trading hours specified above but no later than 10pm on any day.

This licence must be displayed in a conspicuous place on the licensed premises, in a manner that invites public attention.



You are responsible for your customers when they are at your club and as they leave.

The licence must only be used during the months listed here or when a limited licence has been issued.

Persons under 18 years may be at the club unaccompanied for:

- sporting activities and presentation functions only
- training (preparation) or participating in sporting events during the specified trading hours.



Q.10 The tennis club wishes to have a special competition on a Friday night for a month, during which alcohol will be supplied. What must the tennis club do to supply alcohol?

Answers

- Q.1 No, the club is licensed for on-premises consumption only—no takeaway.
- Q.2 'Intoxicated, Drunk, Disorderly?' and 'Under 18? No supply'.
- Q.3 Amenity impacts you should consider include:
- a. is there enough parking for member and visitors to the club
 - b. traffic movement and density
 - c. noise from amplified music coming from the club or from members
 - d. members causing a nuisance of damaging property or cars.
- Q.4 Name, residential or email address, name of the member of whom they are a guest, date of visit.
- Q.5 Yes. The club can supply alcohol to non-members at a non-member event or function held on the licensed premises. However, if the club is hiring out the venue and the event organiser is supplying alcohol, then the event organiser will need to apply for a limited licence.
- Q.6 No. The viewing area is outside the red line on the plan.
- Q.7 Yes. A restricted club licence only permits alcohol consumption on the licensed premises and within the red line area.
- Q.8 No. Joey is with his parents (who fit within the definition of a responsible adult), and so long as Jan or Stan are club members and sign in their guests, there is no breach.
- Q.9 The answers are:
- a. Yes. Providing it is not within the club's red line area.
 - b. No. It is outside the club's licensed trading hours; it is March, and the licence is effective from April to September only.
- Q.10 Apply for a limited licence.
